

Imports in GB requirements

The Government set out a new timetable for introducing full import controls for goods being imported from the EU to GB.

• Since 1 January 2021, phytosanitary certificates (PC) and pre-notification have been required to accompany EU imports of certain species of plants and plant products. Documentary, identity, and physical checks of these goods can be carried out at Places of Destination or Border Control Points.

A full list of which species fall into the above categories can be found here.

To import into GB, you require the following documentation;

- Commercial invoice
- Packing list
- Phytosanitary certificate if required, please see link above

Pre-notification of the goods arriving in GB needs to be carried out either by the recipient or their customs agent before the seed arrives. This needs to be done on IPAFFS, again species falling into this category can be found at the above link.

You can register for IPAFFS on the Gov.uk website.

It is expected from late 2022 that GB will accept ePhyto certificates from the EU for imports, this will also work alongside a cloning system which will pre-populate a large percentage of the pre-notification required.

There will be no further implementation of import controls until December 2023, when the new Border Operating Model is released



Seed sampling/testing of seed imported into GB takes place either at the Border Control Point or Place of Destination, which species are affected, frequency and costs of this can be found in the tables below.

Frequency of checks

The below table shows the inspection frequency from the 1st of July 2022 for seed.

<u>Fees</u>

From the 22^{nd of} July 2022 there has been flat rate for both finished and non-finished for cuttings and plants for planting, however seed and bulbs will remain on the existing fee's structure.
